RUM

WHERE DID IT ALL GO?

During the early colonial era, rum was the drink of choice for most Americans with Massachusetts alone boasting over 63 rum distilleries by 1750. In fact, in 1758 George Washington charmed voters with entertainment and rum to win the election in the Virginia House of Burgesses. However, all the distilleries were using molasses, a British import. So by the mid 1760s, as a result of the new laws enforcing stricter trade regulations, Americans boycotted British imported goods, this meant the end of rum in the colonies. Many distillers quickly gained profit creating domestic spirits out of local crops like corn rather than imported sugarcane, molasses, barley or rye.

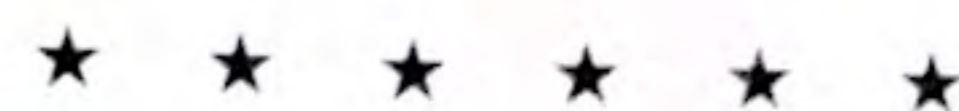

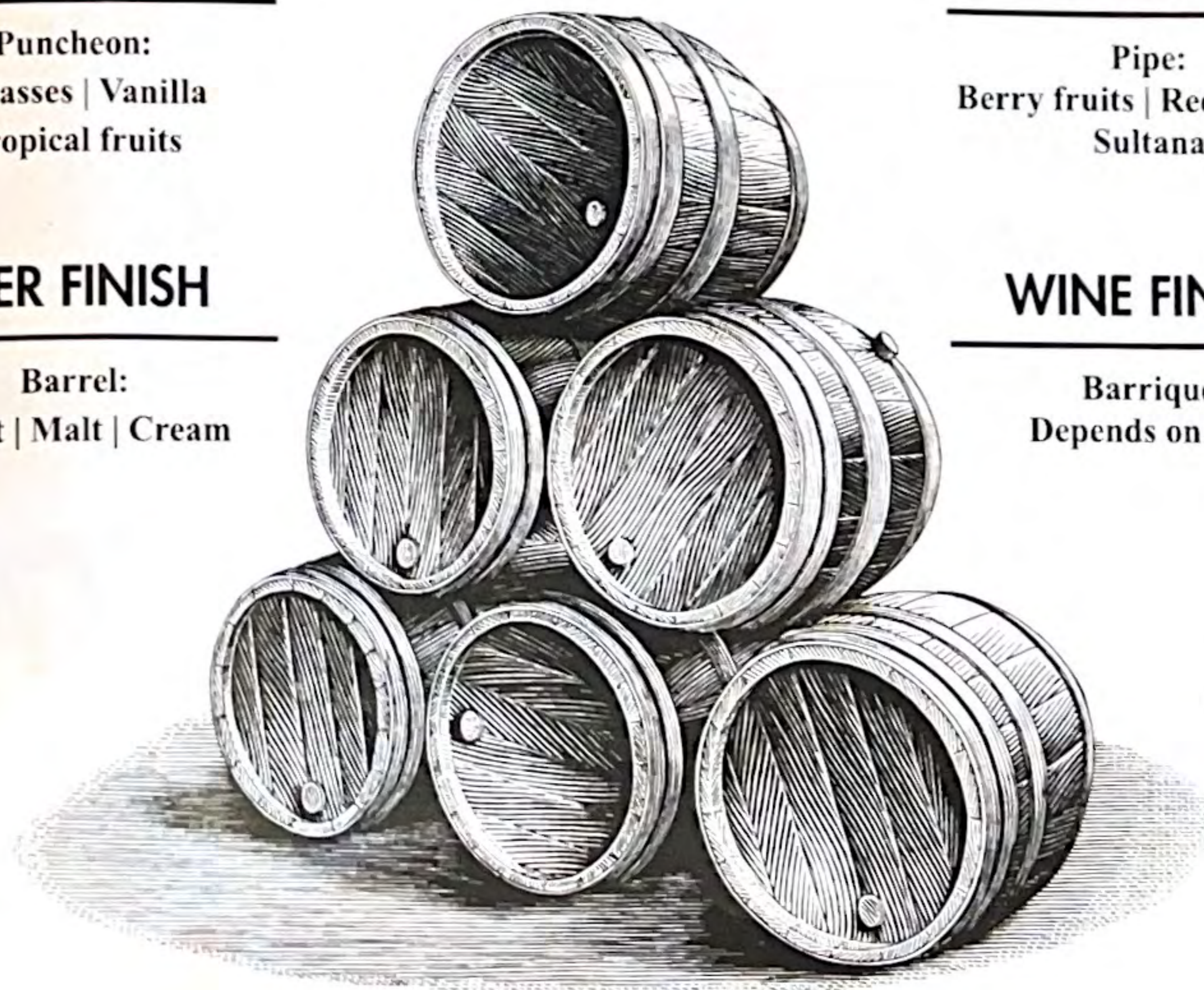

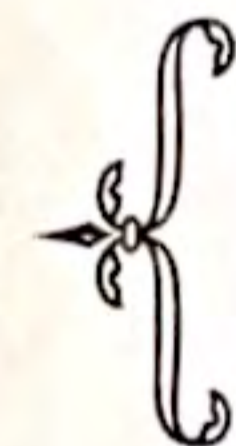

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WHISKY OR WHISKEY?

The answer is, it's both! Or if you want to get technical, neither. The word whiskey comes from the Gaelic word uisge beatha, which directly translates to "water of life" and was used by Irish monks in the Early Middle Ages to refer to the distilled alcohol they made. Over the course of the late 19th century, many of the big Irish distillers began to spell the English translation of whiskey with an e in order to differentiate their whiskey from its Scottish competitors. While early English translations and most distillers around the world spell it whisky, the United States and Ireland today are known for the spelling with the e.

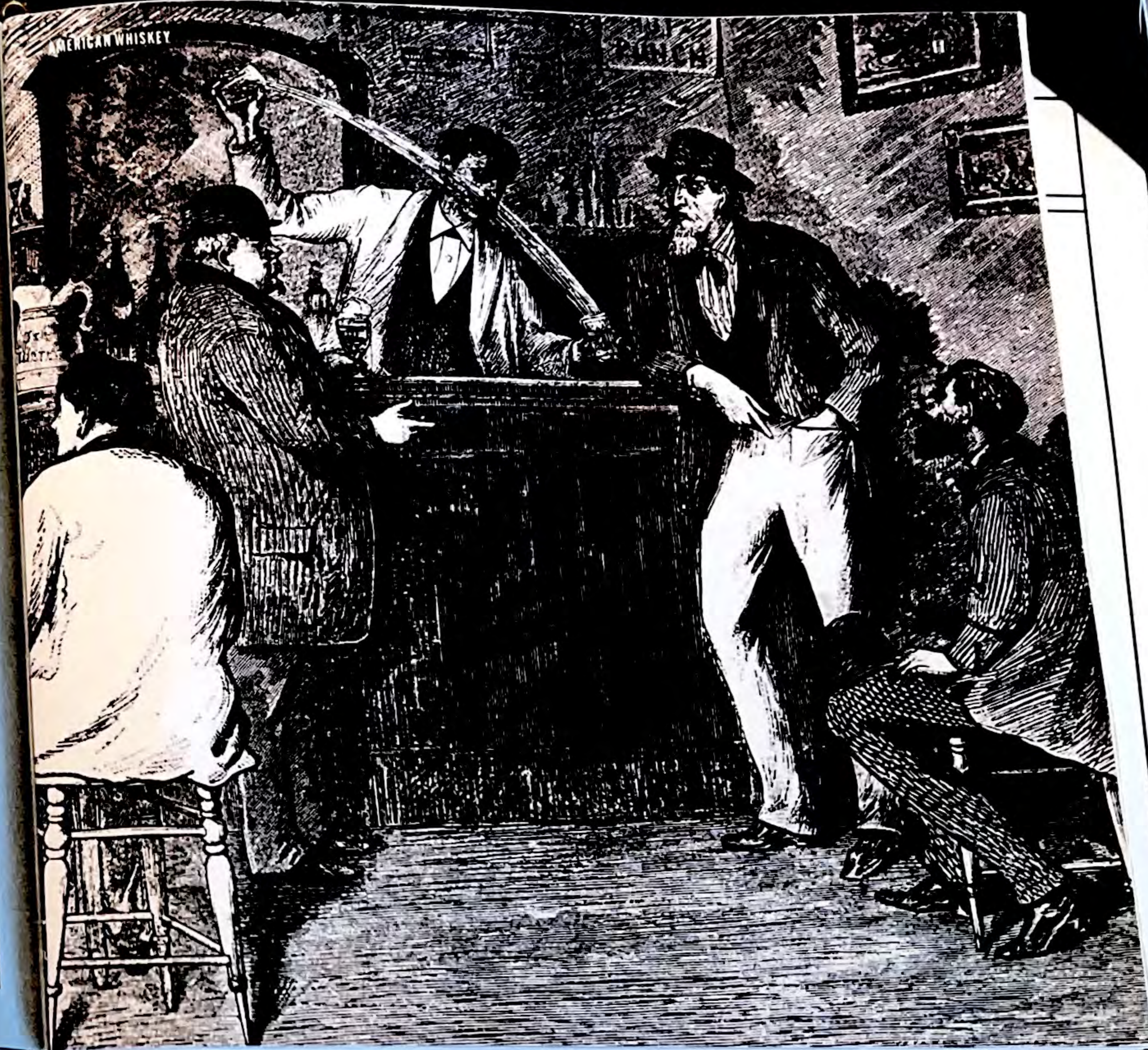

Seen as a symbol of patriotism, whiskey quickly became the preferred choice for most Americans, often even a form of currency. By 1776, the American Revolutionary War, soldiers were supplied with domestic whiskey to help get them through the brutal winters. Early American whiskey started as a raw, unaged spirit, it wasn't until we approached the turn of the century that Americans began to discover that the practice of aging whiskey in oak barrels altered the color to its characteristic amber and created a better taste. While many undocumented stills likely existed before this time, the earliest record of a commercial whiskey distillery in the U.S. was founded in Louisville 1783. Many more appeared around the country and even George Washington is credited with owning his own distillery.

KENTUCKY
BORN

Named after the year Kentucky became a state and inspired by American whiskey's humble beginnings, this award-winning bourbon perfects a local artform over 250 years in the making. While the brand is new, the distillery is old. Founded in 1879, following a number of ownership changes, Prohibition and significant shifts in the whiskey market, the Kentucky-based distillery fell into the hands of its current owners. Today, using a signature "high rye" recipe and the marriage of select barrels, carefully chosen by a Master Distiller, 1792 Bourbon is best known for its expressive and elegant flavor profile.

To pay off the immense debt following the Revolutionary War, the newly formed U.S. government created a "whiskey tax" which ultimately helped fund the American dream. The tax was met with great resistance in what is known as the Whiskey Rebellion, the events of which contributed considerably to the formation of political parties in the United States.

SMALL BATCH

FLAVOR PROFILE

An expressive and elegant flavor profile. Unmistakable spice mingles with sweet caramel and vanilla to create a bourbon that is incomparably bold and brash yet smooth and balanced.



While the term "Small Batch" does not have any precise or legal definition, Small Batch Bourbon typically implies that the bourbon was produced by mixing the contents of a relatively small number of select oak barrels that are mixed together to create a desired taste. The chosen barrels are meant to complement each other to achieve a specific flavor profile. Basically, it means the distillery team really took the time to handpick barrels so you can enjoy the small details that make up your sophisticated and smooth flavor profile.

FLAVOR PROFILE

A complicated crescendo of sweet autumn flavors fall onto the palate with cinnamon, caramel, dried cherries and a dash of vanilla while still maintaining plenty of heat and earthy undertones for a wonderfully captivating drink experience.

Traditionally, the average bourbon begins its barrel-aging with a proof between 80 and 90. Also known as “Cask strength whiskey” Full Proof bourbon begins its barrel-aging with a 125 proof point rating. 1792 Full Proof Bourbon obtains its sophisticated flavor through a unique filtering process, unlike the typical chill filtration and passing only through a plate and frame filter. This allows the bourbon to maintain a robust proof for bottling in addition to shaping plenty of rich and bold character. Bottled at its original 125-barrel entry proof, just as it was years ago when the barrels were first filled, this artfully crafted bourbon is an elegant and distinguished choice of drink.

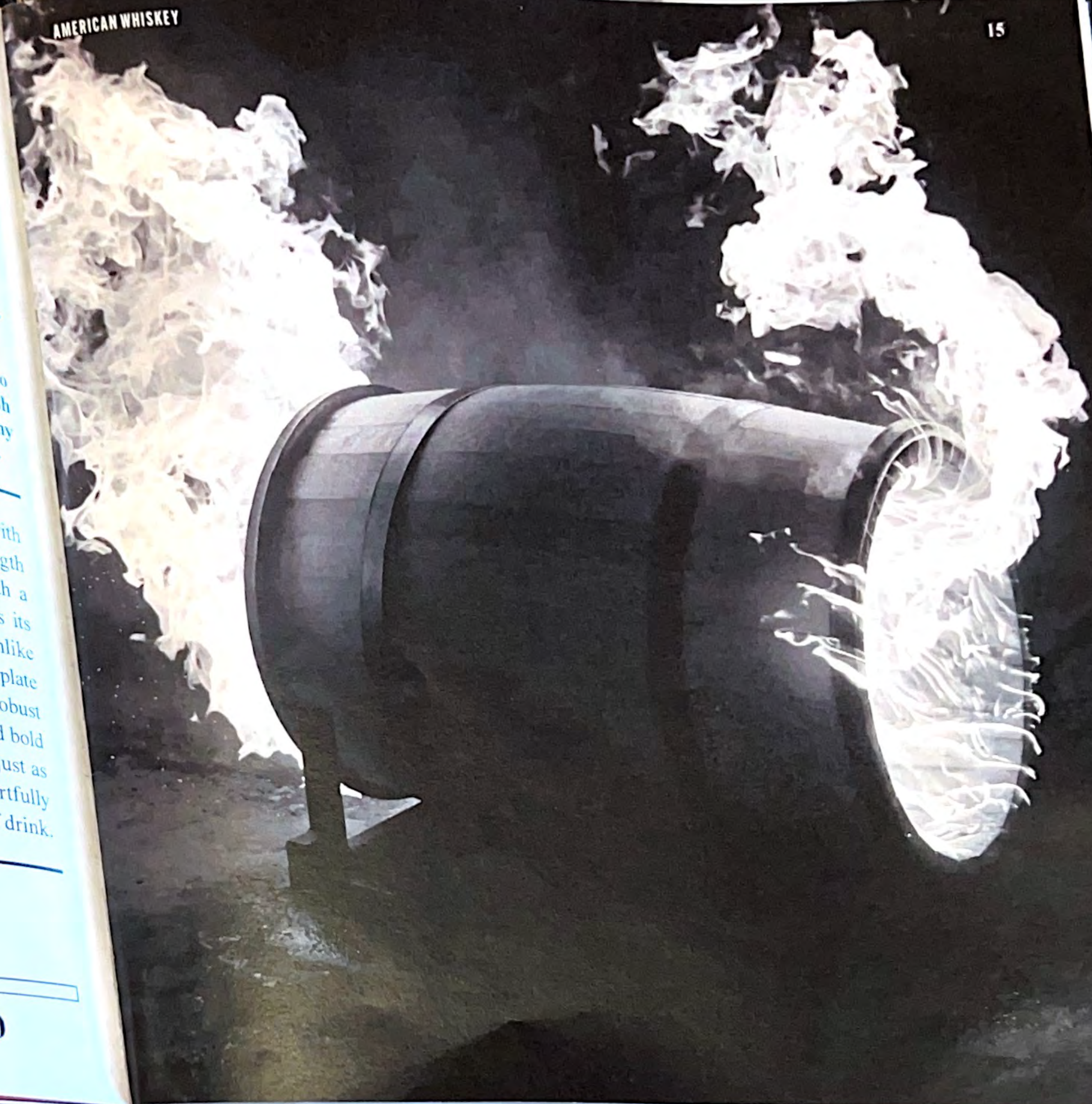

THE RISE OF WHISKEY

The “corn belt” in the Midwest created large new supplies of corn, which was cheaper and more profitable to convert into whiskey than it was to transport great distances without spoiling. So, naturally, corn was distilled into ‘liquid assets.’ As American consumption soared, the number of distilleries between 1790 and 1810 increased to 14,000. By the 1820s, whiskey sold for twenty-five cents a gallon, making it cheaper than beer, wine, coffee, tea and even milk.



Before bottling, whiskey was sold by the barrels directly to tavern owners who would serve it to patrons in their personal flasks, jars or other containers they brought with them.

STRAIGHT BOURBON WHISKEY

FLAVOR PROFILE

A medley of more than 200 detectable flavor notes that cascades from bold grain and wood to sweet aromatics, spice, fruit and floral with a silky-smooth, warm satisfying tail.

Just a few miles outside of Versailles, Kentucky, The Woodford Reserve Distillery—formerly known as the Old Oscar Pepper Distillery and later the Labrot & Graham Distillery—began its operations. The characteristic profile is developed through a meticulous process that puts focus on crafting, toasting, and charring the bourbon barrels, creating a perfectly balanced flavor.

FLAVOR PROFILE

Medium amber in color, smooth with tones of maple, oak, and nutmeg followed by a long, dry, and satiny finish and a light toffee flavor.

In the 1830s a miller by the name of Augustus Bulleit wanted to create a unique bourbon flavor. His take on it included lots of rye in the recipe. Unfortunately, according to the brand, Augustus vanished while transporting barrels from Kentucky to New Orleans. What happened to him remains a mystery.

FLAVOR PROFILE

Following Brown's 3-barrel batching process, the unmistakable clove, nutmeg and cinnamon flow seamlessly into a soft lingering fruit and spice character.

Old Forester 1870 Original Batch honors when Old Forester was created by George Garvin Brown and named after Union civil war surgeon, Dr. William Forrester. To guarantee consistency, George made bourbon batches from three nearby distilleries, sealed his whiskey exclusively in glass bottles and signed each bottle as his personal guarantee of its quality, officially becoming the first bottled bourbon ever.

TENNESSEE WHISKEY BLACK LABEL

FLAVOR PROFILE

The signature smooth, smoky taste and light licorice note lends a nice backdrop to the vanilla, toasted oak, fresh brewed coffee, nuts and toffee flavors.

At a young age, orphan Jack Daniel began working for Dan Call, a reverend who operated a whiskey still in Tennessee. Call's then slave, Nathan "Nearest" Green, was a talented whiskey maker who taught Jack Daniel the art of the still. Jack and Call began their distillery in 1866, the legal documentation of which would not exist until 1875 and appointed Nearest Green as the first African American Master Distiller in American history.

KENTUCKY STRAIGHT WHISKEY

FLAVOR PROFILE

Lush toffee sweetness and dark chocolate with hints of vanilla, fudge, nougat and molasses. Underlying notes of dates, tobacco, dark berries, spearmint and a hint of coffee round out the palate.

As we approached "The Gilded Age of Bourbon," a whiskey salesman by the name of George T. Stagg purchased barrels of O.F.C. and befriended bourbon icon, E.H. Taylor, Jr. When Taylor hit financial hardships, Stagg purchased the O.F.C. Distillery, forming E.H. Taylor, Jr. & Co. Together, they built what is now known as Buffalo Trace Distillery. Uncut and unfiltered, this robust bourbon whiskey ages for nearly a decade and boasts the bold character that is reminiscent of the man himself.

FLAVOR PROFILE

A true sipping bourbon with tastes of caramel corn sweetness, mingled with butterscotch and licorice that shapes into subtle spices of pepper and tobacco.

The Construction of Warehouse C, still standing today, completed Taylor's vision for his "Model Distillery Plant of the World." This small batch bourbon is named after Colonel Edmund Haynes Taylor, an incredibly important figure in bourbon's history from the 1800s who owned a whole host of distilleries and innovated production methods which are still used today.

BLANTON'S SINGLE BARREL

FLAVOR PROFILE

A deep, satisfying nose of nutmeg and spices. Powerful dry vanilla notes in harmony with hints of honey amid strong caramel and corn. A medium finish composed of returning corn and nutmeg flavors.

Albert Bacon Blanton was born into one of the first families of bourbon history. He started at the distillery in 1897 when he was 16 and was appointed president in 1921, his distillery expanded from 44 to 144 buildings, the largest of its day. Before retiring in 1952, Blanton created his very special and limited supply of bourbon - his private reserve - handpicked and stored in what now is known as the famous Warehouse H. Although he passed in 1959, his legacy lives on with his influence and namesake bourbon, which was the first ever Single Barrel Bourbon sold commercially.

1897 BOTTLED IN BOND

FLAVOR PROFILE

A strong dark fruit presence, hints of caramel, vanilla and just the right amount of oak to round it out, the tapering sweetness and light spiciness create an excellent multi-dimensional flavor profile.

A group of professional distillers led by Edmund Haynes Taylor of Old Taylor Bourbon, worked to pass the Bottled in Bond Act. Under this historic law whiskeys labeled as "Bottled in Bond" must be distilled in one six-month season, either from January to June or July to December, aged for at least 4 years, bottled at 50 ABV (100 proof), with nothing other than water added to adjust strength. These many requirements empowered consumers with knowledge of where, when and by whom their bottles of whiskey were produced.

After conflicting ideals over their vision of the Distillery, Taylor separated himself from O.F.C. moving onto other projects while Stagg's salesmanship and financial acumen helped build the distillery into one of the world's leading bourbon producers. In honor of this achievement, the distillery was rechristened in 1900 to bare Stagg's name.

Jack Daniel arrived early for work one day unable to open his safe, (he had a reputation of forgetting the combination) kicking it out of frustration, Daniel broke his toe. The injury worsened and eventually took his life.

FLAVOR PROFILE

This unique expression of Old Forester has undergone a second barreling, granting it exceptional character, a smooth and sweet flavor and a clean, crisp finish.

A fire on the bottling line shuts down whisky production at Old Forester distillery. With an entire vat of mature whisky waiting to be bottled, something needed to be done. Otherwise facing ruin, this whisky was instead stored in new, charred oak containers to rest until the line could be repaired. The resulting product, the first documented double-barreled whisky.

Prohibition in the United States was a nationwide constitutional ban on the production, importation, transportation, and sale of alcoholic beverages from 1920 to 1933. Prohibitionists first attempted to end the trade in alcoholic drinks during the 19th century.

FLAVOR PROFILE

Dark caramel coats layers of malt nuttiness and sweet graham cracker all warmed by green peppercorn and coriander spice brightened with a hint of cedar.

Created to represent the moment when Prohibition begins in the U.S., Old Forester was one of only a handful of companies given a permit to manufacture and sell whiskey during Prohibition. Today, Old Forester remains the only bourbon continually sold by the same company before, during and after prohibition.

WILD TURKEY 101 BOURBON

FLAVOR PROFILE

A light corn oil presence sets the stage for a nice rye spice, baking spices joined by a combination of muted vanilla and oak, leaving a spicy dry oak in its wake.

The “Wild Turkey” brand is said to have risen after Austin Nichols, a wholesaler from a rebuilt local Kentucky distillery took some warehouse samples on a wild turkey hunting trip in 1940. The bourbon proved so popular among his friends they continued to ask him for “that wild turkey bourbon.” Austin Nichols began to bottle Wild Turkey in 1942 and by 1971 was able to purchase the distillery himself.

FLAVOR PROFILE

Nothing but class in a glass with floral honey and oak, warm butterscotch flavor and a smooth vanilla finish.

In a New York City bar, Jackie Gleason introduces Frank Sinatra to Jack Daniel's Tennessee Whiskey and so sparked a friendship that would endure the ages. In fact, it's known that Old Blue Eyes is buried with a bottle of JD and is quoted famously saying, “That's the nectar of the gods, baby.”

MODERN AGE

A man named Pappy began working at W.L. Weller & Sons in 1893 first as a traveling whiskey salesman and eventually as the President of Stitzel-Weller Distillery. He helped shape the industry during and after Prohibition. Through his endeavors in the warehouse, the boardroom and on the road, he built a reputation in the bourbon industry that was second to none. Fine bourbon was his mission, and he accepted nothing less. Pappy's son, Julian Jr., took over the distillery in 1964 following Pappy's passing at the age of 91. Though it was sold in 1972, Julian Jr. created the Old Rip Van Winkle label as a side venture in case his son, Julian III, wanted to follow in his footsteps.

FLAVOR PROFILE

A soft bed of aged oak, cigar leaf, light brown sugar and fruit cake, perfectly balance with delicate strawberry sweetness. This refined and smooth whiskey elegantly unfolds on the palate with feathery vanilla and classic bourbon strength.

After being turned down just a week before, Elmer T. Lee, a WWII Radar Bombardier studying in Kentucky to earn an engineering degree joined the BFT Distillery as a maintenance engineer in 1949. By 1969 he would become the Distillery's first Master Distiller. In 1984, Elmer introduced the world's first single-barrel bourbon, Blanton's Single Barrel. Not long thereafter, Elmer himself was honored with his own single-barrel namesake. His work and legacy have been honored by his induction into the Kentucky Bourbon Hall of Fame, his receipt of the "Lifetime Achievement Award" from both Whisky Advocate and Whisky Magazine and his induction into Whisky Magazine's Hall of Fame.

A sweet vanilla nose with caramel, pecan and oak wood. Smooth, mellow flavor consisting of robust wheat, cherries and oak. Features a long, smoky wheat finish with hints of fruit, spice and oak tannins.

After Julian Jr. passed away in 1981, Julian III took over the business. While premium bourbon business was experiencing a lull, the family had a history of starting from the ground up. So with the same innate passion, Julian III purchased the Old Hoffman Distillery in Lawrenceburg, Kentucky and the quality sold itself. Then in May 2002 Buffalo Trace produced the first batch of Van Winkle bourbons using Pappy's exact recipe, allowing them to maintain their strict quality standards while producing more barrels for future enjoyment.

FLAVOR PROFILE

Subtle and smooth, the gentle flavors of honey, caramel alluringly roll onto the palate with a splash of oak wood mint and roasted nuts that softly balance into a smooth, mellow finish.

Introduced in 1988 and inspired by the company's founder, Gentleman Jack stays true to its original oak flavor with notes of vanilla, however, maintains an exceptionally smooth finish. What they call "double-mellowed" is their term for when whiskey undergoes a second charcoal mellowing process before going through the Lincoln County process in order to achieve its rich and balanced smoothness.

FLAVOR PROFILE

Cherry cordial on the nose followed by caramel and slightly smoked-oak. Dark chocolate, tobacco leaves and dates followed by a lingering finish of leather, black pepper and cinnamon.

Visionary and “Father of the Modern Bourbon Industry” Colonel Edmund Haynes Taylor, Jr. purchased a distillery in Kentucky and christened it “O.F.C.” – in reference to the belief that the finest whiskey was produced in old-fashioned wood-fired copper stills. Today, O.F.C. is a National Historic Landmark known as Buffalo Trace Distillery. Each hand-cut crystal bottle is vintage dated according to the specific year in which the bourbon was distilled. Taylor is remembered as the last of a breed, a true bourbon aristocrat who was responsible for linking the classic and modern eras of bourbon making.

A complex aroma of vanilla, mint and molasses. Notes of brown sugar and spice that give way to oak, toffee, dark fruit and anise. This whiskey finishes long and smooth with serious depth.

The O.F.C. Distillery renovations are completed and it is rechristened as the Buffalo Trace Distillery. The Distillery's new flagship brand—Buffalo Trace—is launched.

Sweet and spicy, the palate is an interesting concoction of contrasting flavors. Brown sugar, caramel, and vanilla are in a constant push-pull with bold rye spice and white peppercorn. Helping drive the spice notes to the forefront are underlying notes of leather and dry oak.

WhistlePig began with the purchase of a farm in 2007, and after a few years of deep consideration and personal reflection, the team at WhistlePig committed themselves to crafting the world's finest and most interesting rye whiskey. With help from Master Distiller Dave Pickerell, they discovered and purchased an incredible stock of 10-year-old blending whiskey in Canada that was being profoundly misused. That initial stock, for which they are forever grateful, is what kicked off their grand adventure.

Bold and assertive, youthful, earthy flavors, nutty notes, spirituous, cereal notes, peanut butter, sweet, caramel, vegetal qualities – warming on the palate.

Edward K. Warren was a staunch prohibitionist who revolutionized the manufacturing of corsets with the use of softer featherbone. His success reached worldwide attention putting Three Oaks, Michigan on the map in the early 19th century. Fast-forward to 2010 when Bill and Chuck Welter purchased the middle section of the historic factory and turned it into Journeyman Distillery, becoming one of the few bourbon distilleries outside of Kentucky.
